Two Of The World's Largest Private Boats In Saint Barth

uite a sight to see! Late morning on Tuesday, November 28, during the course of an hour, two of the largest private boats in the world were anchored near each other in the waters near Corossol, in the harbor outside of Gustavia. Due to their exceptional length, neither of these yachts can anchor at the quay, where the largest boats that can back up to the dock are dubbed "Saint Barth Size," a maximum length of 60 meters.

First was Rising Sun, the giga-yacht that belongs to Larry Ellison, founder of Oracle, a software company that is a main competitor to Microsoft. With a length of 137 meters (452 feet), Rising Sun is as long as the two cruise ships shown in our photo (Seabourn Pride, 134 meters, 208 passengers, and Seven Seas Navigator 170 meters, 490 passengers) in Saint Barth on Monday. Built by Lurssen, a German shipyard in Bremen, Rising Sun started out at 120 meters, but was increased to become the largest megayacht in the world (a title it

still holds although word is out that a 147-meter yacht, code name M-147, should be completed by the end of 2007).

The second mega-yacht that pulled into port was the Perini Navi-built Maltese Falcon, owned by Tom Perkins (another industry titan in Silicon Valley). This 88-meter/288-foot sailing yacht arrived in the waters of Gustavia on Tuesday. It was impossible not to notice the world's largest sailboat, which measures 16 meters longer than Mirabelle, the former holder of the longest sailboat title. Not only is it the longest, but Maltese Falcon is also an extremely

interesting boat, an advance look at the boats of tomorrow, with a unique threeall-composite masted, square rig, with carbon/ epoxy masts towering over 180 feet. The rig was designed by architect Gerry Dijkstra and fitted with six curved carbon fiber arms, or horizontal structures that support the massive selffurling sails. The masts rotate to trim the sails, which essentially form one large, continuous sail surface, when deployed, for maximum aerodynamic efficiency. How much does all this cost? Somewhere in the hundreds of millions of dollars!

For Willy Rozenbaum*, "a vaccination against AIDS is a perfect illusion."

ne of French doctors to first discover the AIDS virus in 1983, and president of the French National AIDS Council for the past three years, Dr. Willy Rozenbaum presided over the 13th bi-COREVIH* (Regional Centers of Information and Care for Human Immune Deficiency) meeting that took place in Saint Martin, October 19-26. During the meeting, the doctor presented his position on the current fight against the AIDS virus. For him, the idea of an anti-AIDS vaccine is still just an illusion. This interview conducted by Jénovefa Eche, our correspondent in St Martin, was translated and published here on the occasion of World AIDS Day, commemorated around he world on December 1st every year

Jénovefa Eche: More than 20 years have passed since the discovery of HIV. Can you retrace the medical progress made in the fight against this virus?

Willy Rozenbaum: There have been large scientific and therapeutic advances made over the past 20 years in the fight against HIV. After the discovery of the

virus in 1983, the first large step was taken in 1986, with the advent of treatments that could slow the progress of the disease. A little later, researchers put their fingers on a combination of medical treatments, the much heralded antiretroviral therapy, which can considerable lengthen the life expectancy of someone who is HIV positive. Since 1996, much progress has been made in the simplification of these treatments, from the way they are administered to the decrease in negative side effects, for example. The past few weeks have marked the death knell for treatment via multiple pills, as it is now possible in certain cases to provide therapeutic treatment in one sincapsule. Finally, researchers has also made progress in terms of the tolerance of these medications: today, the negative side effects are less consequential for those who carry the virus, and many can live perfectly normal lives.

Jenofeva Eche: What are the steps being taken in terms of prevention? Are researchers still working on a vaccine that could eradicate this disease? Willy Rozenbaum: In the years to come, scientists will continue to work toward the simplification of treatment and their degree of tolerance. We hope to be able to replace the cocktail of pills a patient now takes on a daily basis with one simple monthly injection. But the eradication of the disease is probably not possible. After 20 years of research, we are still in a position where the invention of a vaccine to prevent the virus is still an illusion. Today, we must look for new avenues of research, such as genetic grafting. As far as prevention is concerned, researchers are working on the fabrication

working on the fabrication of microbicide products that would work like spermicides currently on the market, and would limit contamination during sexual intercourse. Research on such preventative treatment seems promising.


Lion's Club District 63, which encompasses the West Indies and Guyana. The winning poster from the region will be sent to the Lion's Club



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
ONE FISHERMAN FOUND, ONE STILL MISSING AFTER BOAT SINKS

The chances of finding Alex Porsant, a 50 year-old man from Martinique, whose fishing boat sank during the night of Tuesday, November 21 to Wednesday, November 22, are extremely slim at this point. But since his body has not been found, he is still on the long list of those reported missing at sea. Jean Eliska, a 40 yearold Haitian, was luckier: after floating at sea for more than 36 hours, he was recovered late on Thursday by a chartered sailboat that had set sail from Colombier. Exhausted and dehydrated, and holding onto an ice chest used by the fisherman, he was able to

muster enough force to swim close to the boat, which then brought him into the Port of Gustavia, from where he was taken to the Hospital de Bruvn. On Tuesday, November 21 the two men set out from Marigot, Saint-Martin on a 27-foot motor boat en route to a fishing zone located between Antigua and Saint-Kitts. They reached their destination at around 11:00pm according to Jean Eliska, who told the story of their drama to the gendarmes. The weather and conditions at sea were not very favorable, but the two men decided to anchor the boat for the night, before starting to fish the next morning.


They were surprised by large swells caused by rainfall and the boat was unable to follow the movement of the sea. The first wave filled the boat with water, which proved to be fatal, sinking the boat and putting the fisherman in the ocean. Alex Porsant, who is not a good swimmer, was able to pull himself into the very large ice chest that had also fallen into the water but was very unstable. Jean Eliska, who knows how to swim. stayed in the water holding onto the ice chest. All day Wednesday, the two men remained at sea, searching in vain for a boat in the vicinity. During the night, the force of the ocean

overturned the ice chest, causing Alex Porsant to fall back into the water. Jean Eliska continued to float until mid-morning on Thursday, when he finally saw a sailboat in the distance. He swam toward the boat and got close enough to attract the attention of the crew. The sailboat had just left Saint Barth, but turned back to take Jean Eliska to the Port of Gustavia. He has since left the Hospital de Bruyn and has returned to Saint Martin where he lives. A manoverboard alert was sent out by the CROSS (Regional Center for Rescue at Sea) for Antilles-Guyana in an attempt to find Alex Porsant.



Hurricane Season Quiet in 2006

global hile experts predicted that this year's Northern Atlantic hurricane season would be as active as that of 2005, in actuality the season was rather quiet. There were just nine hurricanes that were strong enough to be named, for a lower average than that of recent years: one has to go back as far as 1997 to find a season that calm. It is also a lower number of named storms than was predicted by the researchers at the University of Colorado, who had initially estimated between 13 and 16 tropical storms, of which 10 would reach hurricane status and four to six of those would be of major proportions. These predictions were lowered



as the season progressed. Of this year's nine hurricanes, four remained tropical storms, and five developed into full-blown hurricanes. The most powerful storms were Gordon and Helene, which attained category 3 status on the Saffir-Simpson scale, with maximum winds of 125 mph. None of these storms threatened Saint Barth or neighboring islands, which have not been under hurricane alert since the year 2000. The 2006 hurricane season officially closed on Thursday, November 30.

Roger Richter: From Sweden With Love



e fell in love with Saint Barth in 1993, during his first visit to the island. A well-known runner in his native Sweden, Roger Richter was sent by Klas Hamnar, owner of the Swedish travel agency, Westindianspecialisten: His mission was to organize a group of Swedish runners for the third edition of the Gustavialoppet (Hamner, along with Saint Barth resident Patrick Perron d'Arc, was responsible for the renaissance of this 10km marathon in 1991). In economic terms, the mission was a flop, since Roger could only convince nine runners to participate, but it was a big success in terms of the conservation and development of the historic ties that bind Saint Barth and Sweden. To this day, Roger can see himself arriving at Le Select for the first time, with a photo in hand that Klas had given him of Marius. He was looking for this intriguing islander with the unusual name of Stakelborough. "I tapped a man on the shoulder who looked like the one in the photo. And indeed it was Marius," says Richter. "Wel-Welcome!" Marius replied, and thus their friendship began. Impressed by the warmth of this welcome, Roger went out of his way once he was back in Sweden to convince the travel agency not to cancel this symbolic journey. "I was able to convince them," he recalls. "The next year, in 1994, there were 34 of us." This was quite a challenge for Richter, whose "day job" is far from the world of running marathons: he is actually a marketing and advertising consultant, who handles campaigns for the largest sporting goods stores for runners in Sweden.

In any case, the 37 year old Richter does not hide his love for Saint Barth: In early 1994, he was contacted by Lotta Kronstam and asked to participate in a meeting, in Stockholm, of the Saint Barth Society, the friends of Saint Barth association in Sweden, for which Olle Nyman was president at the time (he sadly passed away last year). Roger became vicepresident of the association in 1995 and president in 2001. This active association is responsible for the printing of the 600-page tome, Who's Who in Saint Barth, a broad "family" tree for the island based on extensive research done by the historian Per Tingbrand, another Swede who fell under the charms of Saint Barth. In 2005, the association also released a DVD version of a 37-minute 8mm film that had been shot in 1952 by Baron Sten Gustafsson Nordenskhold. This film is a unique look at the Saint Barth of yesteryear, and is available from ASBAS, the Saint Barth Friends of Sweden Association, whose current president Daniel Blanchard.



A former professional runner, Roger Richter still enjoys a good marathon. Every year, with a group of fellow Swedes he accompanies to the island, he runs in the Gustavialoppet, a race that marks the friendship between the people of Sweden and Saint Barth. In 2006, Richter finished in 40th place, completing the 10-km itinerary in 49 minutes and 11 seconds.


Lukcy Photo Shoot In Saint Barth

What does she like about the island in addition to the fantastic light: "The shopping is densest in Saint Barth, which is more established than say, the Dominican Republic which is on the up swing. Saint Barth is also like a self-contained village, you can go everywhere," she says, pointing out that Greenfield's photos "are amazing. e may not have graduated from one of the top French cooking schools, but the passion he shows for his profession is worth a few stars on his toque. "He" is 34 year-old Philippe Bigot who took over the reins in the kitchen at the Christopher, the four-star luxury hotel in Point Milou, as of November. He brings a new take to the menu and the high quality of his cuisine brings Taïno — the hotel's gourmet restaurant— back to the top of the list of the best tables in Saint Barth. This talented chef hails from Brittany, the town of Lorient to be exact, and he worked in Paris and London before joining the group Accor six years ago. He was based in Saint Martin before deciding to break out on his own and take over the kitchen at the Christopher. His specialties are varied: Like many good chefs, Philippe Bigot is as interested in meat and fish as in desserts, and he also serves as pastry chef. And what a pastry chef he is! The origi-



nality of his dessert menu is equal to the excellence of his confections. His list of sweets includes the island's only Omelette Norvégienne, a real treat for two. This classic French recipe is to die for! But if you are looking for something a little more unusual try the

Caramel Soufflé with salted butter, a recipe from Brittany not found elsewhere in Saint Barth. But the desserts are just the icing on the cake. For appetizers: If you can have but one, go for the Foie Gras with figs. It is homemade and the combi-

nation of foie-gras and figs is absolutely delicious. Then again, there is also a delightful Red Tuna Tartar with mango/basil. On the menu of main courses distinctive flavors reign, from cod marinated in coconut milk (a light, refined dish for those who don't want to overdo it) to a hot/cold combo of mahi-mahi, or local dorado, on a bed of cherry tomatoes. Epicures will enjoy the filet of beef in a crust with foie gras and chanterelle mushrooms (be sure to ask for the proper temperature to avoid having the beef overcooked). Another special is the duck parmentier, made with slices of duck confit under a layer of potatoes. Delicious.

Dinner is served on the terrace, overlooking the hotel's lovely swimming pool and the waves rolling onto the shores of Pointe Milou. On Tuesday-Saturday evenings, there is live music provided by pianist Phil Nardone as of 7:00pm.


